Heartlanders Cruise on Florida's Longest River

While winter and spring were in a tug-of-war for control at our home port on southern Missouri's Table Rock Lake, late March and early April in central Florida showed spring in full charge. With the promise of shirt-sleeve weather we joined about dozen classic boats that made the 2009 "Northbound St. John's River Cruise" hosted by Florida's Sunnyland ACBS Chapter.

The Heartland Classics Chapter was well represented on this year's southbound and northbound St. John's River cruises. Chapter members Susan Miller and Larry Nichols made the pre-Lake Dora boat show trip south from near Jacksonville to Sanford in ARRRGH!, a 1974 Chris Craft XK-19. Carolynn and I did the "northbound" cruise following the boat show in Big Thom, our 18' 1963 Thompson Super Lancer and were joined for parts of the cruise by Bill and Kay Joslyn in their 25' 1941 Chris Craft Sportsman. Bill and Kay regularly attend the June Heartland Classics Cruisin' Weekend at Table Rock.

The first day's run would be our longest at around 80 water miles. The other four days would cover closer to 40 or 50 miles of water. Although, keeping track of the miles was a trick on this river as the mile markers re-start at least three times. On other rivers on which we have cruised the mile markers remain constant from beginning to end. No one seemed to have a good explanation of why they changed on this river. This caused no problems as Sunnyland Chapter's Cruisemaster for the "northbound" cruise, Gerald Dake, provided us excellent charts for use while on the river.






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



Yellow Jacket times 3

Some old habits are just hard to break. In 1973, when sons Kimball and Mitchell were 6 and 3, we discovered a 14' Yellow Jacket Riviera molded plywood boat deserted in a Nebraska marina without an engine, but in superb condition. We made an offer that was accepted, towed it home and began to give it a little TLC. We soon began planning a trip to Lake Okoboji in Northwestern Iowa. That trip uncovered a 30 hp Johnson of the same year at a local dealer and so began our love affair with old wooden boats, and Yellow Jackets in particular. That first Yellow Jacket Riviera is shown here with the boys.





Some 30 or so years later the second 14' Yellow Jacket found its way to our home. This one was a 1956 Catalina model and needed a more dedicated restoration effort including stripping the existing finish, bleach, some wood replacement, stain and 10 coats of varnish. It was completed just in time for display at the 4th Annual ACBS International Show held at Lake of the Ozarks, Missouri in 2005. I am sure that during that event we must have heard of at least 200 folks that "learned to ski behind a boat just like that", or "my uncle's cousin had a boat just like that".

And finally, we have spent part of this last year restoring our third Yellow Jacket, another 14 foot Riviera, this one a 1958 vintage. This boat had obviously endured many hardships during the first 50 years, and much of the time it must have been subjected to some tough Oklahoma summers and winters. So, in addition to the stripping, bleaching, staining and 10 coats of varnish, we replaced the mahogany plywood decks and reupholstered the seats. The 35 horse Johnson engine is from the same year and is original to the boat.



A little history – The Yellow Jacket Boat Company was in business in Denison, Texas for 10 years from 1949 to 1959. The company was founded by R. A. McDerby and one of the owners of the company was none other than Roy Rogers, of Dale Evans and Roy Rogers fame. You may remember seeing Roy in some of their ads in the 1950's, that is, if you are old enough to remember the 1950's.

In the beginning the hulls were molded by a company in Canada and shipped to Texas for finishing. Most of the boats were in the 12 to 16 foot size and were powered by 25 to 40 hp outboard engines. A limited number of boats were powered by a Fageol Products Company inboard engine.

So, time will tell, but surely there must be another Yellow Jacket somewhere in our future!
